As our operations scale, our approach has matured from fragmented initiatives into a comprehensive strategic framework rooted in a deep understanding of the "living cities" and communities we serve.

Future Generations

Empowering youth by creating educational and developmental opportunities that prepare communities for tomorrow and strengthen human talent driving the future of energy and water.

Climate Action

Leveraging our role as a provider of clean energy and desalinated water to support solutions that mitigate emissions, enhance climate adaptation, and protect natural resources for posterity.

Community Resilience

Delivering innovative, local solutions that respond to the evolving priorities of each of our host communities in 15 countries, prioritizing long-term interventions.

Through our social initiatives in people and planet, Acwa continues to weave a network of social and environmental impacts that grows year after year. This report highlights our giving in 2025, moving beyond passive compliance to tailored impact.

Our approach is underpinned by robust governance and dedicated teams, enabling us to respond effectively to national and international shifts and integrate seamlessly with non-profit and government partners, reinforcing Acwa's position as a trusted partner in sustainable development.



Executive Summary

At Acwa, Corporate Social Responsibility is a strategic imperative rather than a peripheral effort. It is the living expression of our core values, where operational excellence meets ethical stewardship. Driven by our vision to lead the global transition in energy and water, we deliver on a mission rooted in the responsible, sustainable production that powers a better future.

In 2025, Acwa continued to strengthen its strategic CSR framework to keep pace with national and global shifts. This framework is closely aligned with the objectives of Saudi Vision 2030 and global ESG agenda, reinforcing the private sector’s role in driving socio-economic and environmental development. Our approach is underpinned by robust corporate governance and a structured CSR entity, ensuring a unified identity, maximized impact, and seamless collaboration with non-profit organizations and relevant national stakeholders.

While our strategic CSR directions provide a unified vision, we intentionally adapt our approach to

meet the specific needs of host communities across our -15country footprint, ensuring global scale with local relevance. Our efforts are concentrated on three primary pillars: Future Generations, through supporting education in energy and water technologies and building vocational capacities; Climate Action, by contributing to the protection and restoration of ecosystems; and Community Resilience, by addressing high-priority issues within our host communities.

In 2025, Acwa achieved a tangible social impact through the execution of 78 social initiatives, with a total social contribution of SAR 36.27 million. These initiatives have had a direct positive impact on the lives of over 300,000 beneficiaries across more than 10 countries. This contribution was strategically distributed across three core pillars, including: Future Generations: Received the highest giving with SAR 27.0 million (74.4% of total giving), targeting support for more than 3,000 students. Supporting Host communities: Contributed SAR 6.6 million (18.2% of total giving), benefiting 3,000 families.

Climate Action: Allocated SAR 2.7 million (7.4% of total giving), focusing on major environmental initiatives, most notably the planting of over 100,000 trees.

Geographically, Uzbekistan and the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia accounted for the largest share of our giving contributions at (18%,62%) alongside notable contributions in South Africa, Morocco, Egypt, Jordan, Oman, and the UAE. Through this report, Acwa reaffirms its commitment to evolving its CSR operations, enhancing strategic partnerships, and directing initiatives toward sustainable impact: empowering people, protecting the environment, and advancing local and global sustainable development.

1. Future Generation



Our CSR priority is dedicated to empowering the next generation with essential knowledge and skills in energy and water technologies. This is delivered through a holistic framework of programs, initiatives, and support services. Our objective is not to define a single path to success, but to provide multiple gateways for growth, allowing individuals the flexibility to shape their trajectories based on capability, circumstance, and choice. We offer a robust network of opportunities that begin with education and extend to skill acquisition, confidence building, health, and a sense of belonging. This diversity is not merely a structural addition, but a strategic necessity born from a reality where professional and social challenges intersect, necessitating empowerment across multiple dimensions.

The Future Generations initiatives are distributed across several integrated areas, addressing development as a cumulative process. These include: Training and Employability and Entrepreneurship Support.

In 2025, Acwa's future generations investments evolved into a cohesive, long-term human capital



strategy, shifting towards integrated pathways that link access, capability building, and employability. Across geographies, our approach prioritized depth of impact, institutional partnerships, and sustainable models that translate education into tangible socio-economic outcomes.

Our programs addressed the full education-to-employment continuum, combining infrastructure development, academic and technical training, scholarships, and applied learning environments. This portfolio was intentionally designed to respond to local needs while maintaining a consistent global focus on future-ready skills, gender inclusion, and workforce localization in the energy and water sectors.

A defining feature of the year was the kick-off of our partnership with the social development bank in Saudi Arabia to start the kingdom's first business incubation for SMEs in renewable energy and water desalination which align community development with business and national priorities. These efforts strengthened Acwa's role as a long-term partner in national human capital agendas, rather than a standalone donor.

Internationally, the breadth and credibility of our education portfolio attracted strategic interest from global institutions such as IFC, reflecting the growing recognition of Acwa's CSR programs as platforms for systemic impact rather than short-term social support.

Financial Contribution

Acwa allocated 74.4% of its total CSR funding to this pillar. This includes major programs such as the International Scholarship Program, Shirin College in Uzbekistan, the Sustainable Energy Academy in Egypt, female student housing development, and the establishment of educational, cultural, and athletic facilities across multiple jurisdictions.

Under the "Future Generations" pillar, Acwa empowers youth, students, and engineers of both genders to acquire the expertise required to lead the future of the energy and water sectors. Initiatives include advanced academic tracks, specialized engineering training, and early education support across our operating markets. Shirin Energy College (SHEK)

 Uzbekistan

Shirin Energy College (SHEK) stands as a flagship CSR initiative for Acwa in Uzbekistan. It represents a pioneering educational model designed to elevate local technical education and develop a highly skilled workforce capable of leading the energy and emerging technology sectors. This initiative aligns with the Uzbek government’s strategic vision and is bolstered by technical support from the Energy and Water Academy (EWA) in Saudi Arabia. Following a presidential decree elevating the institution from a vocational school to a specialized college granting university diplomas, a strategic Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between Acwa, the Ministry of Energy, and the Ministry of Higher Education, Science, and Innovation of Uzbekistan.

This strategic transformation coincides with a significant scale-up in Acwa’s community investment, which is projected to reach SAR 75 million by 2030.

Central to this transformation is the "Al-Jabr" Program, managed by EWA. The program has established a comprehensive roadmap to align the college with international standards, involving rigorous technical assessments to bridge pedagogical gaps and the development of a curriculum that integrates academic theory with hands-on application. The college offers two primary tracks:

Government Education Program

A two-year vocational track for Grade 9 graduates.

Acwa and EWA Professional Program

A two-year intensive track for Grade 11 graduates, followed by a full year of On-the-Job Training (OJT) at Acwa’s operational sites, with permanent employment opportunities for high-performing graduates.

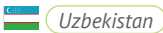

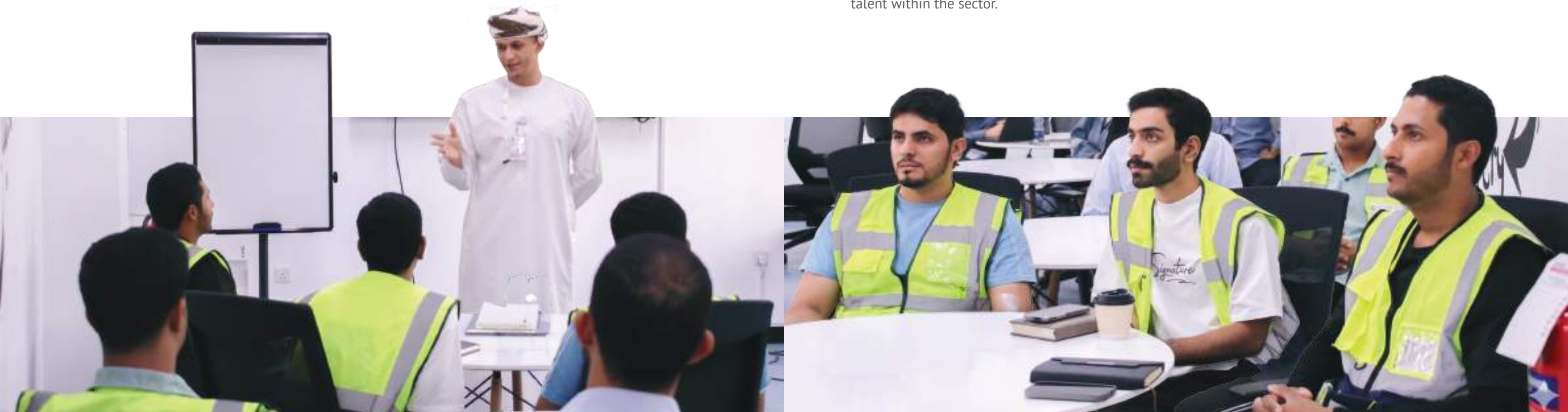

The Small and Medium Enterprise (SME) Incubator for the Water and Energy sectors was launched with a transformative vision to empower entrepreneurs by financing sustainable energy solutions. This strategic initiative is a fruitful collaboration between the Social Development Bank (SDB)—leveraging over fifty years of developmental expertise—and Acwa through the “Energy of Tomorrow” Hackathon. The strategic value of this initiative lies in aligning the ambitions of the next generation with national clean energy targets, providing entrepreneurs with a platform to explore innovative business models and gain specialized expertise in the global energy market.

This partnership features integrated roles to ensure project scalability; while SDB manages the structural and financial frameworks, from registration and hackathon organization to fund management and impact monitoring, Acwa provides direct technical and operational mentorship. This includes field visits to flagship projects like the Sudair Solar PV plant and leveraging the expertise of Acwa’s professionals for specialized consultancy. Furthermore, the company plays a pivotal role in connecting innovators with international suppliers and industry leaders. To scale this impact, an additional SAR 3 million was injected into the fund to expand support for SMEs within the sector.

Following the transfer of the workshop facility from the local commune to the cooperative, Acwa entered a strategic partnership to fund infrastructure upgrades and the procurement of essential industrial equipment. This initiative empowers local youth and stimulates professional entrepreneurship within the region. SAR 48,722 was allocated from the 2024 budget for essential equipment and machinery. SAR 12,200 was allocated from the 2025 budget to cover workshop rental costs for two years.

2. Climate Action



At Acwa, our environmental stewardship is underpinned by a commitment to rapid decarbonization, resource efficiency, and accelerating the global transition to clean energy. Our strategy is operationalized through three strategic pillars: Afforestation, to expand local vegetative cover and sequester carbon; Climate Solutions, aimed at optimizing energy and water efficiency while enhancing community adaptation; and Ecosystem Preservation, dedicated to protecting natural

habitats and biodiversity across our project sites. This holistic approach ensures long-term climate resilience and delivers tangible environmental and social value to our host communities.

In 2025, Acwa's climate initiative achieved significant milestones.

We are restoring approximately 50 hectares of degraded land within the Imam Abdulaziz bin Mohammed Royal Reserve with over 50,000 drought-tolerant native trees.

Additionally, we planted

60,000 mangrove trees

in Rabigh, a high-impact nature-based solution, with each tree capable of sequestering approximately 0.35 tons of CO2 annually. Our climate actions also extended to Uzbekistan, where we established 20 MW of solar capacity, providing clean energy to over 230,000 beneficiaries.

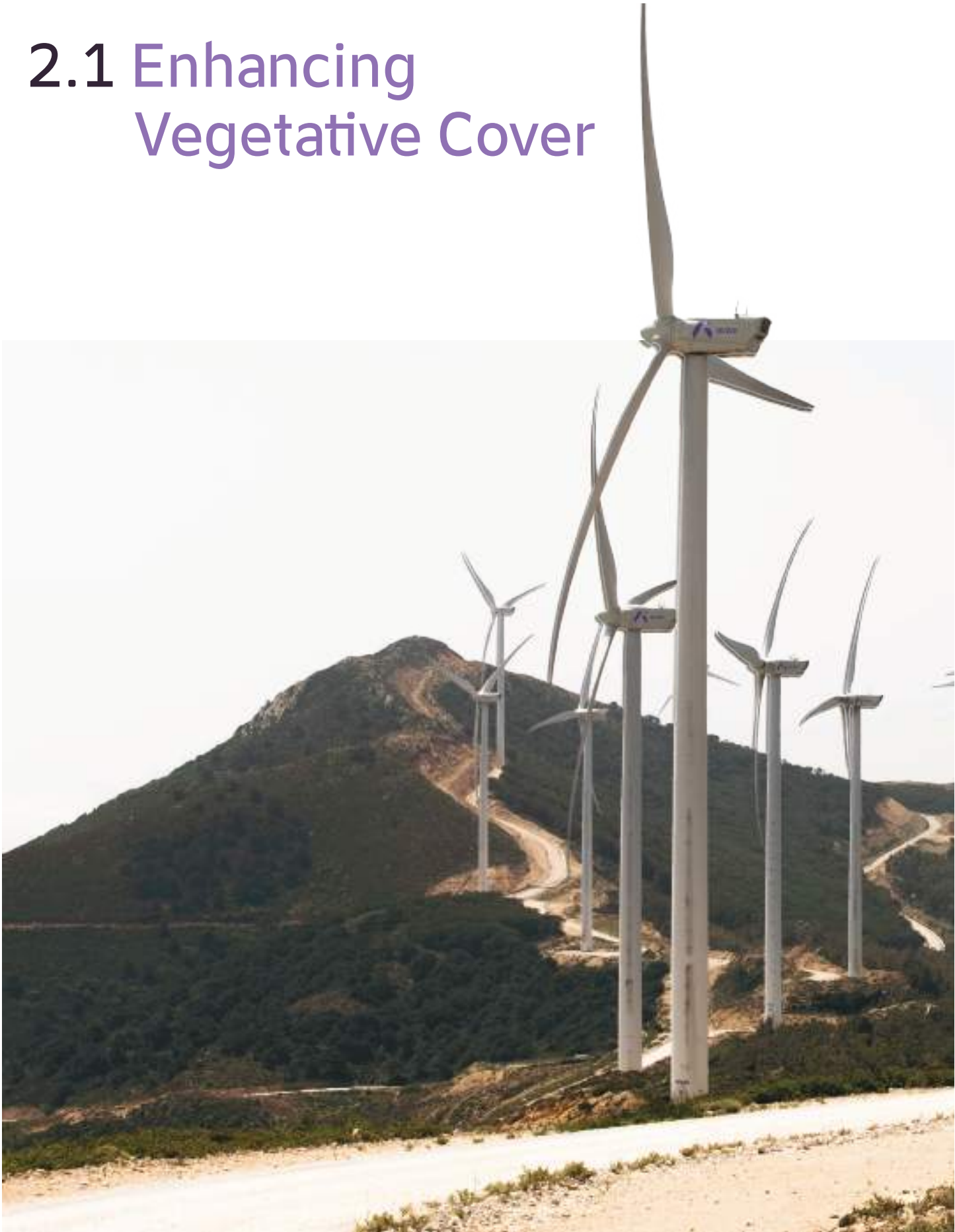


Furthermore, we allocated

to the **Coral Research and Development Accelerator Platform (CORDAP)**, reinforcing our commitment to protecting marine biodiversity, from the coral reefs of the Red Sea to the hawksbill turtles at the Hassyan plant.

2.1 Enhancing Vegetative Cover



Acwa is committed to bolstering vegetative cover and ensuring its sustainability through initiatives that protect ecosystems, increase greenery, and empower local farmers and producers. These efforts support environmental security, promote sustainable livelihoods, and strengthen the role of host communities in the conservation and development of natural resources.

To this end, Acwa has dedicated its efforts to expanding vegetative cover through ongoing afforestation initiatives, structured as follows:

Ecosystem Restoration Initiative

 Saudi Arabia

This initiative focused on the restoration and rehabilitation of degraded lands within the arid environments of the Imam Abdulaziz bin Mohammed Royal Reserve, in collaboration with net zero. The project aimed to plant 50,000 drought-tolerant native trees, utilizing the Ecosystem Restoration (ECORES) approach. This methodology prioritizes long-term ecological health over traditional grid-based planting by working with the site’s natural topography and ecological patterns.

The initiative integrates rainwater harvesting systems, targeted soil enhancements, and biodiversity integration to increase landscape resilience. These measures contribute to reducing soil erosion, improving water-use efficiency, and increasing the survival and growth rates of vegetation while lowering future operational costs associated with irrigation and replanting. The adoption of the ECORES approach aligns with the Reserve’s stringent environmental regulations, protecting its delicate ecosystems and preventing the introduction of invasive species. This initiative not only rehabilitates 50 hectares of degraded land but also serves as a sustainable model for arid land restoration, supporting biodiversity and climate change adaptation.

Zarqa Initiative

Saudi Arabia

Impact and Deliverables

This initiative was launched following the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed during the 16th session of the Conference of the Parties (COP 16) of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification. The project aims to collaborate with the Ministry of Environment, Water, and Agriculture (MEWA) to bolster water sustainability efforts. In partnership with the Ministry of Education as the implementing partner, the initiative focuses on raising awareness among female students regarding the importance of water conservation and resource management across schools and educational institutions in the Makkah, Riyadh, and Eastern Regions. Acwa's financial contribution to this initiative amounts to SAR 300,000.

Afforestation Initiative in Al-Jouf

This initiative focused on enhancing environmental sustainability and community resilience in the Al-Jouf region through an afforestation project in Sakaka. The project aligns with the objectives of the Saudi Green Initiative (SGI), which aims to expand vegetative cover and improve environmental quality. Executed in partnership with the Sudair Al-Jouf NGO for Wild Trees, the initiative empowers community-led environmental efforts and fosters local participation in the protection of natural resources. The project was funded by SSEC with a total contribution of SAR 100,000.

2.2 Climate Solutions



Acwa is at the forefront of developing low-emission power generation projects that accelerate the global transition to clean energy. By reducing carbon footprints and empowering both host communities and industrial sectors, we aim to institutionalize sustainable energy practices for the long term.

Our efforts are dedicated to implementing initiatives that drive clean energy adoption and enhance resource efficiency across our global operational footprint.

Solar PV Hybrid Initiative

 Uzbekistan

This flagship initiative reflects Acwa's commitment to social responsibility by developing sustainable energy infrastructure in remote regions of Uzbekistan. The program targets critical facilities, including schools and hospitals, as well as low-income households, providing them with access to clean and reliable power via hybrid photovoltaic (PV) systems. In strategic partnership with the Ministry of Energy and the Ministry of Employment, the initiative has also catalyzed the creation of "Green Jobs" in underserved areas. The project follows a five-phase strategic roadmap designed to address growing geographical energy needs:

- Phase 1 (0.5MW)**
Project inception in Sirdarya to establish the initial operational model.
- Phase 2 (2 MW)**
Qualitative expansion across three key regions: Sirdarya, Bukhara, and Tashkent.
- Phase 3 (7 MW)**
Focusing on high-capacity integration of 14 central community power stations in Samarkand, Navoi, and Karakalpakstan.
- Phase 4 (4.6 MW)**
Enhancing hybrid solutions in the most remote areas through 15 central stations and home systems.
- Phase 5 (6 MW)**
Future Sustainability (planned for 2026) to achieve the cumulative 20 MW target through an additional 16 central stations.

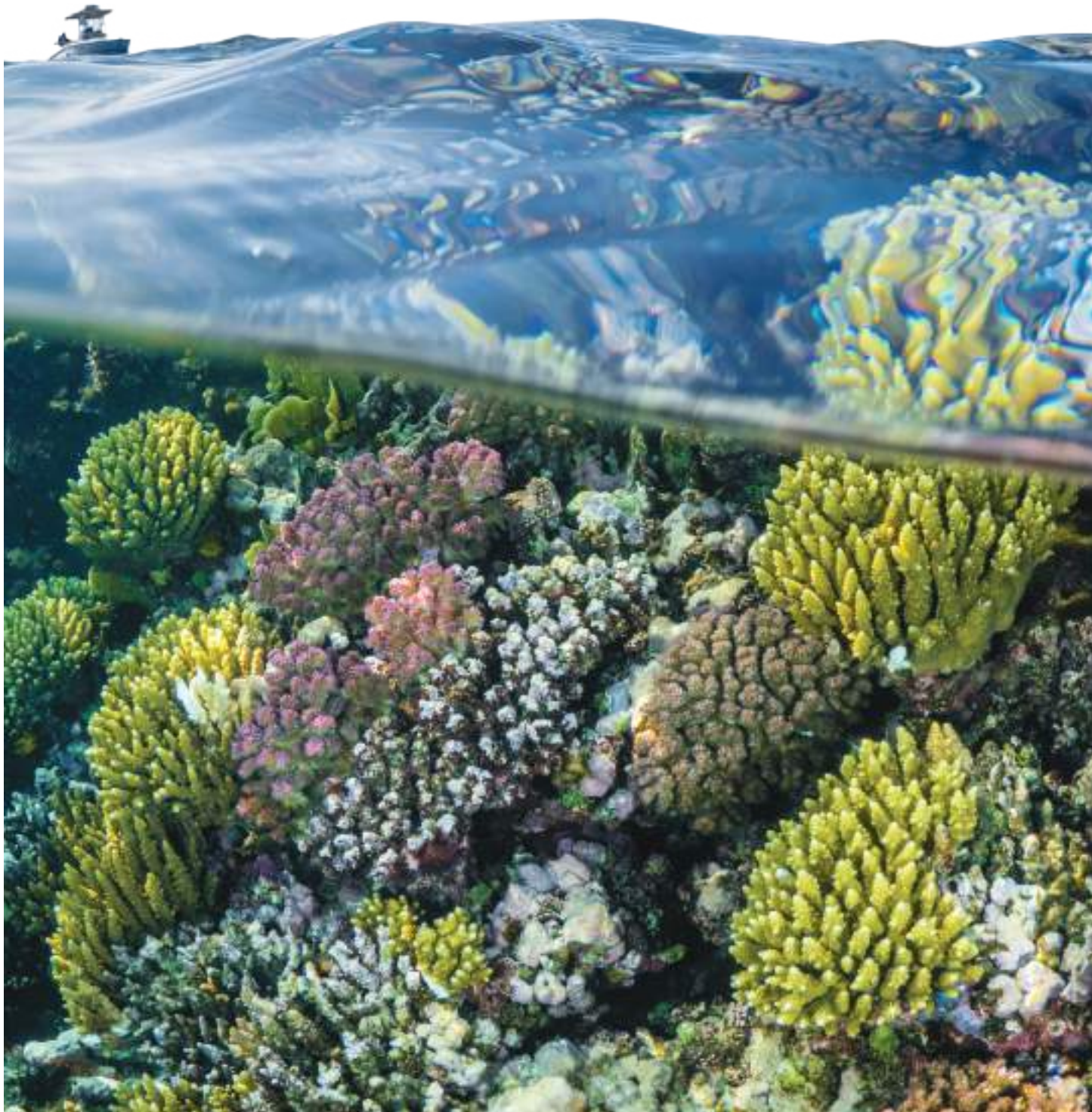

2.3 Ecosystem Preservation and Biodiversity



Acwa places a high priority on ecosystem preservation and the enhancement of biodiversity as part of our commitment to environmental sustainability and corporate responsibility across our operational footprint. Through specialized initiatives and programs, the company seeks to protect natural habitats, mitigate ecological risks, and support scientific research. By fostering capacity building

and raising community awareness, we aim to achieve ecological balance and amplify the positive environmental impact of our projects on the surrounding communities.

Coral Research and Development Accelerator Platform (CORDAP)

 Saudi Arabia

Acwa has extended its support to CORDAP as both a financial contributor and strategic partner, with an initial contribution of SAR 2,000,000. This funding is directed toward global innovations aimed at protecting and restoring 30 of degraded coral ecosystems worldwide. Acwa actively collaborates with CORDAP to shape annual outcomes, including the selection of research projects and the development of capacity-building programs. Furthermore, the company provides in-kind contributions through a partnership with the Energy and Water Academy (EWA) to train national talent and enhance their competencies in marine sciences.

In terms of operational execution, SAR 1,200,000 was fully invested in R&D for 2025. This included supporting the Global Cryopreservation Network, led by the Smithsonian Institution, which achieved a scientific breakthrough in successfully preserving and reviving larvae of the endangered "Pillar" coral. Additionally, the company supported the development of the "Clean Reefs" digital platform in collaboration with the University of Queensland, which has commenced real-world application in Fiji and the Solomon Islands to track land-based pollutants. Furthermore, SAR 250,000 was allocated to a scoping study for developing emergency response plans for the Red Sea and Caribbean regions to address bleaching crises and storm damage.

Impact and Deliverables

Global Research Support

Funding the development of the GRINN system, which integrates bio-conservation technologies with genetic data to enable the restoration of endangered coral species within operational zones.

Establishment of the "Coral Academy"

Launching specialized training programs in collaboration with EWA to train 15 Saudi practitioners by January 2026.

Issuing the "Clean Reefs" web application to support decision-makers in marine pollutant management and equipping 5 international biorepositories for coral sample preservation.

Strategic Partnership with KAUST

Signing an agreement to fund emergency response and restoration studies in the Red Sea, ensuring the sustainability of local marine projects.

3.1 Access to Water and Energy



Acwa is committed to enhancing water and solar energy efficiency within host communities through strategic initiatives aimed at developing irrigation infrastructure, improving agricultural processes, and expanding access to clean energy. These efforts are designed to drive environmental and economic sustainability while improving the quality of life for beneficiaries in remote regions.

Our initiatives in resource management and energy solutions are detailed below:

Water Network Partnership with Sekaya Foundation

 Saudi Arabia

Impact and Deliverables

In collaboration with the Sekaya Foundation and the Al-Rumaidah Humanitarian Services Association, Acwa supported the establishment of a mini-water network serving five villages in the Al-Rumaidah center. This initiative addresses the critical water gap in the region by providing a network powered by integrated solar energy systems and equipped with individual consumption meters, ensuring sustainable water security for the community.

The project ensures these families receive essential electricity services, fostering social stability in isolated areas. The initiative included the procurement and installation of integrated home solar systems. Acwa allocated SAR 40,000 to fund this project.

Rehabilitation and Development of Water Infrastructure



Morocco

Impact and Deliverables

Following geological shifts caused by recent seismic activity in the Ghassate commune, several traditional water sources were lost. In response, Acwa, in partnership with the Ghassate commune and supported by the Moroccan Agency for Sustainable Energy (MASEN), launched a project to rehabilitate water networks and reconnect affected "douars" (villages) to new water sources. The project involved funding the installation of transmission and irrigation pipes and the construction of water reservoirs. Total project cost was approximately SAR 581,400, with Acwa contributing SAR 62% (362,655 of the total cost).

As a complementary project to water infrastructure development, Acwa equipped three agricultural wells with solar-powered pumping systems in the villages of Tiflit, Tasselmant, and Ait Ali Ou Moussa. The initiative aims to provide a reliable and sustainable water supply for irrigation while reducing reliance on conventional diesel pumps. Acwa's contribution to this project amounted to SAR 96,900 from the 2024 budget.

Through these initiatives, Acwa strives to deliver measurable socio-economic impact while strengthening local and international partnerships. Our key 2025 initiatives include:

Al-Murjan for Electricity Production CSR Program

Supporting Local Production

 South Africa

Impact and Deliverables

As part of Acwa’s commitment to socio-economic development within our host communities, the company has continued its Emerging Farmers Support Program in the Kheis region of the Northern Cape, South Africa, since 2013. The program aims to empower small-scale livestock farmers, enhance local production, and create sustainable employment opportunities in a semi-arid environment characterized by water scarcity and climate challenges.

The program focuses on developing agricultural infrastructure across three municipal commonage farms: DeWittsville, Opwag, and Kalahari Kid. Key developmental interventions include borehole drilling, installation of solar-powered pumps, and irrigation system upgrades, alongside emergency provision of feed and veterinary medicine. Executed in collaboration with the Department of Agriculture and Phuhlisani NPC, these initiatives have secured water supplies, reduced operational overheads, and improved overall productivity. Furthermore, the program has enabled young farmers to scale their herds and diversify income streams despite ongoing infrastructural and market access challenges. Acwa remains dedicated to evolving this support through breed improvement programs, management training, and sustainable water resource solutions to ensure long-term regional impact.

Featured Success Stories

Emerging Farmers

Gerhard Maritz is a key beneficiary of the Emerging Farmers Support Program in the !Kheis Municipality. Having commenced his agricultural activities in 2007 with 200 sheep, Maritz has successfully scaled his operations to include 68 Nguni cattle alongside 140 sheep.

Prior to Acwa's intervention, Maritz faced significant operational hurdles due to chronic water scarcity, relying on costly water trucking from Groblershoop. Through the Local Production Support Project, the farm's water infrastructure was transformed via borehole drilling and the installation of advanced pumping systems. This transition to a stable, on-site water source has significantly reduced operational overheads, enabled herd expansion, and optimized rangeland management. Looking ahead, Maritz aims to further enhance herd quality and upgrade livestock handling facilities to ensure the long-term sustainability of his meat production operations.

Frans Nel represents a legacy of farming, having grown up in a family that lived and worked on the land for generations. In 2018, he secured a renewable seven-year lease, launching his independent venture with just 10 Dorper sheep. In a few years, Nel has remarkably expanded his livestock to over 200 head, including sheep, goats, and cattle, leveraging the farm's diverse vegetation.

Through Acwa's infrastructure support, Nel improved water accessibility across various camps, expanded land utilization, and lowered the operational costs associated with livestock hydration. He currently markets his produce through the Groblershoop abattoir while maintaining a portion for household subsistence. Nel's future objectives include improving breed quality, developing specialized animal handling facilities, and enhancing the farm's fire-risk readiness.



Opwag Farm

A Model of Communal Success



Located near Groblershoop, Opwag Farm is a 2,500 - hectare communal landholding acquired through the land reform program. It is managed as a shared resource by eight farmers under the supervision of the !Kheis Municipality, fostering a model of collective agricultural excellence.

The developmental phases of the farm have focused on long-term water security:

2022 Phase

Borehole drilling was initiated at a cost of **SAR 45,230** to secure a sustainable water source.

2023 Phase

A more comprehensive infrastructure project was implemented, involving the procurement and installation of solar-powered pumps, water storage, and distribution systems, alongside specialized livestock watering facilities. This phase, part of a broader **SAR 124,891** regional investment, has significantly enhanced water resource efficiency and communal operational capacity.

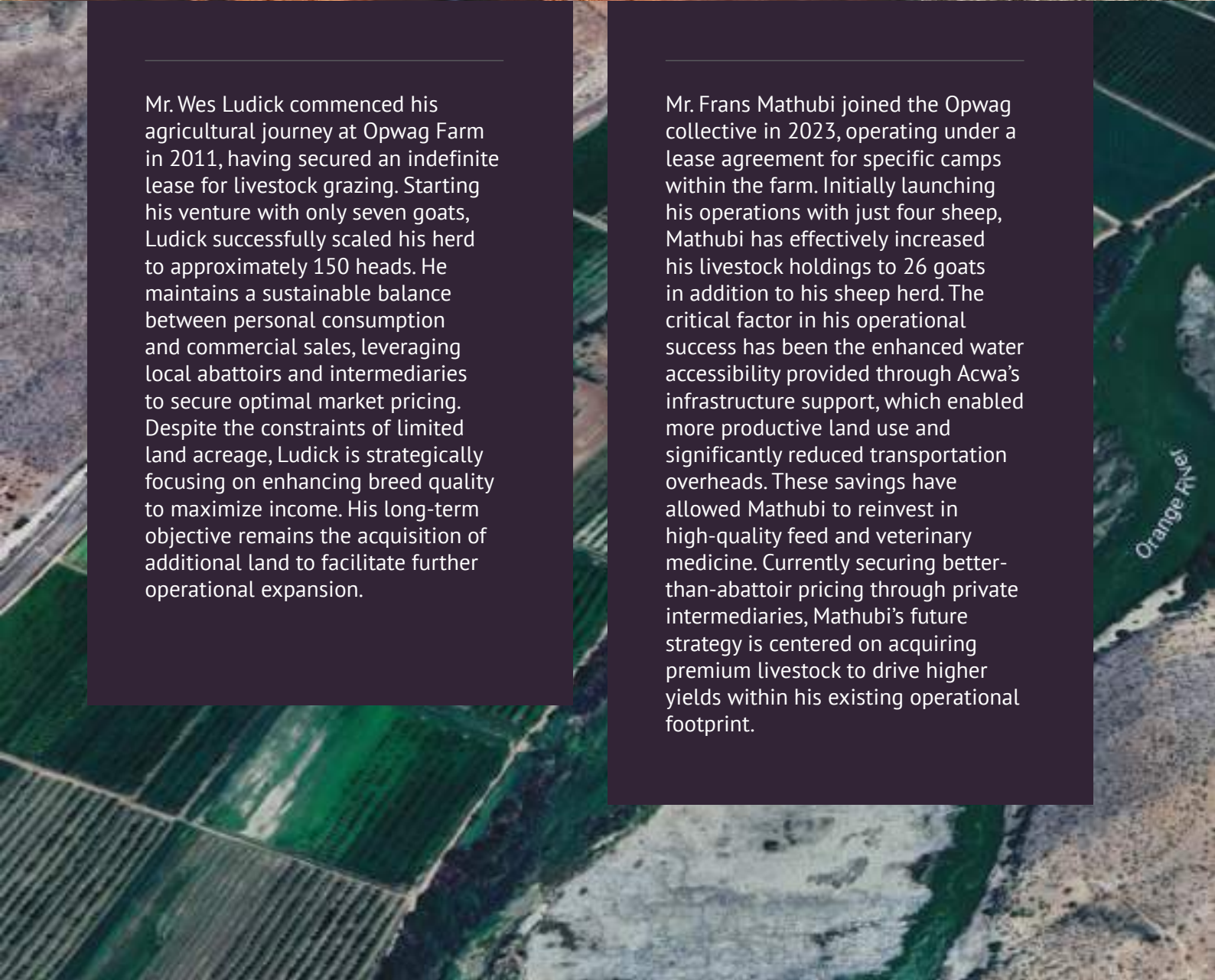


Featured Success Stories

Opwag Farm

Mr. Wes Ludick commenced his agricultural journey at Opwag Farm in 2011, having secured an indefinite lease for livestock grazing. Starting his venture with only seven goats, Ludick successfully scaled his herd to approximately 150 heads. He maintains a sustainable balance between personal consumption and commercial sales, leveraging local abattoirs and intermediaries to secure optimal market pricing. Despite the constraints of limited land acreage, Ludick is strategically focusing on enhancing breed quality to maximize income. His long-term objective remains the acquisition of additional land to facilitate further operational expansion.

Mr. Frans Mathubi joined the Opwag collective in 2023, operating under a lease agreement for specific camps within the farm. Initially launching his operations with just four sheep, Mathubi has effectively increased his livestock holdings to 26 goats in addition to his sheep herd. The critical factor in his operational success has been the enhanced water accessibility provided through Acwa's infrastructure support, which enabled more productive land use and significantly reduced transportation overheads. These savings have allowed Mathubi to reinvest in high-quality feed and veterinary medicine. Currently securing better-than-abattoir pricing through private intermediaries, Mathubi's future strategy is centered on acquiring premium livestock to drive higher yields within his existing operational footprint.



Kalahari Kid Farm

Driving Youth-Led Agricultural Growth

Kalahari Kid Farm stands as one of the largest agricultural assets in the region, spanning 11,103 hectares. The farm is strategically partitioned, with a 2,600-hectare section dedicated to five emerging farmers. Located adjacent to the town of Groblershoop, the farm presents unique challenges, particularly stock theft, yet it distinguishes itself through an exceptionally high level of engagement from young farmers.

Over the past 12 months, the farm has undergone significant infrastructure development:

2024

Installation of a comprehensive livestock watering system at a cost of **SAR 115,528**.

April 2025

Testing of four existing boreholes and the drilling of two additional wells, totaling **SAR 161,485**.

June 2025 (Planned)

Finalization of a project to deliver advanced pumps, tanks, and piping systems, further enhancing water resource management and operational productivity.

Featured Success Stories

Kalahari Kid Farm



Jolicia Julius commenced her operations in June 2023, managing a dedicated camp with an initial livestock holding of 20 sheep and 12 goats. Through diligent management and the utilization of the farm’s new watering systems, she has successfully expanded her herd to 82 sheep and 39 goats. By bypassing local abattoirs and utilizing intermediaries, she has secured higher market prices. Despite facing challenges such as overgrazing and security issues, Julius aims to further scale her livestock, enhance breed quality, and pursue advanced vocational training to solidify her agricultural expertise.

Mr. Amos Smith joined the Kalahari Kid collective in 2020. Initially starting with only six goats, Smith has expanded his livestock to 42 goats and 5 sheep, despite substantial losses due to theft. Smith’s strategic objective is to transition into a Stud Farmer, focusing on high-quality breeding stock rather than the traditional meat market. The integration of solar-powered water infrastructure has been a “game-changer,” significantly reducing costs and facilitating growth. His future priorities include securing additional land and accessing premium markets for his high-value livestock.

Youth Empowerment

Health and Skill Development

 South Africa

Impact and Deliverables

In partnership with the loveLife Foundation, Acwa executed a comprehensive community empowerment program from April 2024 to March 2025. Targeted at the Kheis Municipality, the program integrates health promotion with vocational skill development across six strategic pillars: Y-Centre Services, Skills Development, Community Health Promotion, Sports and Recreation, Psychosocial Support, and Primary Healthcare.

Operating within a total budget of SAR 1.96 million, the initiative provides critical support to youth and families affected by addiction and educational disruption. Furthermore, the Vitality Room provides essential primary care, reproductive health consultations, and family planning services in collaboration with the Departments of Health and Education and the South African Police Service (SAPS).

Y-Centre Engagement

Welcomed 14,450 visitors, exceeding the annual target of 12,000.

Community Health Outreach

Reached 26,595 beneficiaries through health dialogues and community festivals.

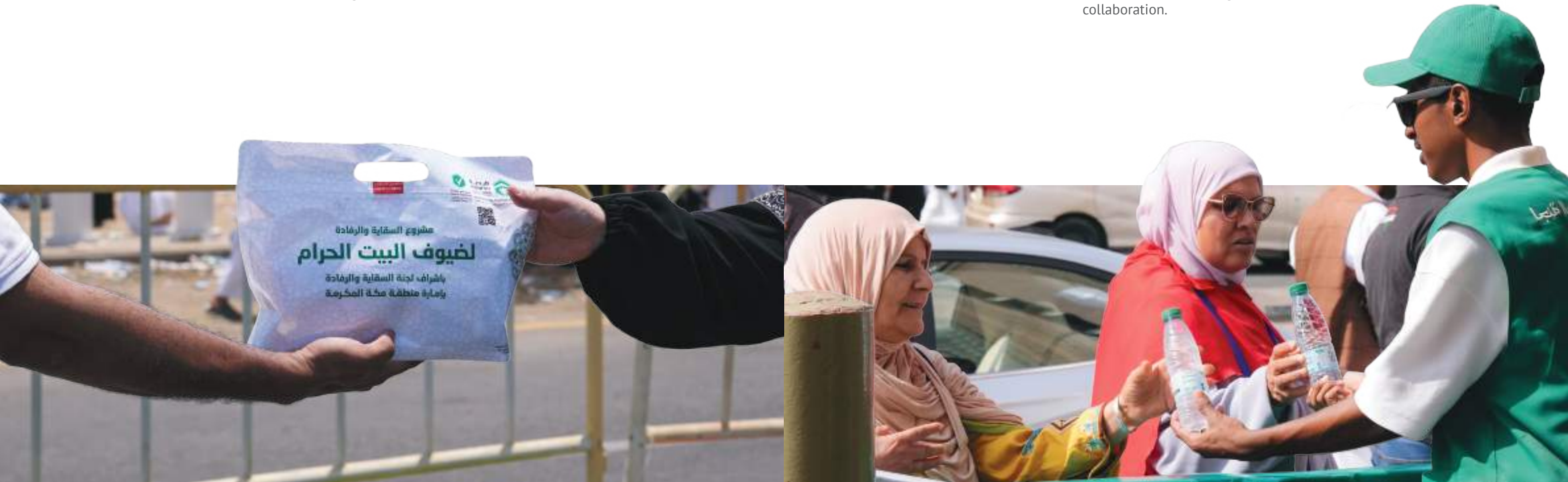

1. Employee Donation Matching Program

In line with Acwa's deep-rooted culture of giving and social responsibility, the company launched the **Employee Donation Matching Program**. This strategic initiative empowers our workforce to support the social and environmental causes they value, effectively doubling the impact of their contributions. Under this program, Acwa matches eligible employee donations to accredited non-profit organizations on a **1:1 ratio**. The program features a minimum donation threshold of **SAR 50** and an annual cap of **SAR 2,000 per employee**, managed within the company's approved CSR budget. This initiative extends across all business units and majority-owned subsidiaries, ensuring robust governance and alignment with Acwa's strategic CSR focus areas.



2. Employee Volunteer Program



Acwa’s Volunteer Program provides a structured platform for employees to contribute their time, professional expertise, and skills to create a lasting positive impact in host communities. The program is designed to strengthen community ties and support the key pillars of our CSR strategy: **Future Generations, Climate Action, and Community Resilience.**

The program categorizes volunteer activities into two primary streams:

1. General Volunteering

Participation in community outreach, environmental protection, and service-based activities.



2. Skills-Based Volunteering

Leveraging professional competencies to provide consultancy and technical support for community-driven initiatives.
